MINUTES OF VESTRY MEETING and **ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING 22 March 2015**

Vestry Meeting for the Purpose of Electing Two Churchwardens

Welcome and prayer

The Rev. John Armstrong opened the meeting with prayer.

Election of Churchwardens

John Armstrong thanked Hilary Crosby, who was not seeking re-election (and is also standing down from the PCC for a year) for all her hard work over the past year; (gratitude by way of applause was given by all present.)

One nomination for churchwarden had been received: for Stephen Adams, duly proposed by Jenny Thorne and seconded by Mary Williams. There being no other nominations the above was duly elected for the following year.

Rev. John Armstrong prayed for Stephen on behalf of the whole Church.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting: Members Present 28

1. **Apologies for Absence**

Apologies for absence had been received from John Cherry, Peter Rollins and Julia and Brian Cobb

2. Minutes of APCM Meeting held on 23 March 2014

The minutes were agreed as a correct record and signed by the chairman.

3. **Matters Arising**

There were no matters arising

4. Reports

John Armstrong thanked all those who had contributed to the reports and encouraged everyone to read them. These reports were taken as read with the exception of the item on Page 7 under 'Parish Administrator' the address of the Church office should read **74D** Coventry Street.

5. **Election of Diocesan Synod Representatives**

John Armstrong confirmed that:

- (i) Barry Parker and Stephen Adams are continuing as Deanery Synod Representatives and thanked them for their continued dedication.
- (ii) Margo Grant's term on the Diocesan Synod comes to an end in June and she is not seeking re-election. Thanks were extended to Margo for her dedicated work in this area.

John Armstrong informed the meeting that the Deanery are working on a long term plan which has not yet been finalised. Prayers continue to be given for the Church in the wider area and to the Clergy and other representatives.

6. **Appointment of Independent Examiner of Accounts**

The meeting noted that Elizabeth McBride was prepared to continue in this role and was duly re-elected; proposed by Ruth Tresidder and seconded by Margo Grant.

7. **Election of PCC Members**

The meeting noted that St. James was entitled to appoint up to nine lay members to the PCC based on an electoral roll of 94. Currently there were six vacancies. Three nominations duly proposed and seconded had been received and on the basis that no other nominations were forthcoming the following were duly elected to serve on the PCC. Jan Ford (proposed by Barry Parker and seconded by Margo Grant); Margo Grant (proposed by Pat Adams and seconded by Chris Cook); Bill King (proposed by Jan Ford and seconded by Rade Ognjanović). It was agreed that the terms of office for the three new members (i.e.) Jan Ford, Margo Grant and Bill King will be three years (until 2018) (proposed by Ruth Tresidder and seconded by Pat Adams). John Armstrong declared them elected Pat Adams (until 2016), Ruth Tresidder (until 2017) and Jenny Thorne (until 2017) continue to serve as elected members.

John Armstrong stated that Noreen Nutt and Iris Lloyd were not seeking re-election after one year as Lay members and that Shirley Hurley is stepping down. Thanks were given to them on behalf of members, together with thanks to Margaret Mumford for taking on extra administrative duties over the past year.

8. Re-election of Sidespersons en bloc

The current rota of sidespersons was approved and re-elected en bloc with the addition of Esther and Jeff Greaves being proposed by Betty Phillips and seconded by John Tresidder.

9. **Any Other Business Vote of Thanks**

John Armstrong thanked everyone who had contributed to the Ministry in this Church with special mention to:

- (i) John Tresidder for his outstanding and dedicated hard work over the years which has been considerable in the areas of the fabric of the church building and grounds. (Applause was given by the Church).
- (ii) Rade Ognjanović who works quietly behind the scenes and is invaluable. (Applause was given by the Church)
- (iii) John Hedge who faithfully and tenaciously has not given up on his teaching in the area of 'Children's group;' even though there is a lack of attendees. (Applause was given by the Church)

Annual Report for 2015 - continued

Background

The PCC co-operates with the incumbent (Rev. John Armstrong for the period 1 January – 15 November 2015) in promoting, within the parish, the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical.

Membership

The PCC is a charity excepted from registration with the Charity Commission in the Southam Deanery in the Diocese of Coventry. Members of the PCC are either ex officio or elected by the annual parochial church meeting in accordance with the Church Representation Rules.

The PCC has no connected charities.

The PCC employs one part-time member of staff.

No member of the PCC, or any connected person, has benefited financially from the PCC. Expenses incurred on behalf of the PCC have been reimbursed.

The PCC also has maintenance responsibilities for the fabric of the church and of the churchyard.

Church Attendance

Following revision there are currently 91 members on the Church Electoral Roll of whom 11 are not resident within the parish (2015:94 with ten not resident within the parish).

The average Sunday attendance was 67 (2014:67), but, as in previous years, average numbers increased at the various festivals and for baptism and thanksgiving services. It was particularly encouraging that numbers attending our Advent and various Christmas Services was well up on recent years, an encouraging base from which to work. The numbers of young people attending the church under the age of 16 remains very low.

Review of the Year

The Reverend John Armstrong announced that he was leaving to help the Parish of St John's, Kenilworth, taking up a post in an evangelistic and pastoral capacity. John's last day of service was 15 November 2015.

As a consequence, the PCC had a number of discussions with Archdeacon Morris Rodham who, with others in the Diocese and our Deanery, had spent some considerable time considering how mission and ministry at St James could develop and flourish. This being against a background of St James having not being able to pay c£110k of parish share in recent years and insufficient funding to afford a full-time stipendiary minister.

The proposal, that I am delighted to say has been agreed and is set out below, was formally announced on 24 January 2016 and is based on Rev. Vikki Bisiker, who knows the area, providing full-time, interim stipendiary ministry to St James for a period of four years with effect from 1 March 2015. The focus of the interim ministry being:

- the fulfilment of the Diocesan Mission Purpose of Worshipping God, making new disciples, and Transforming Communities, via the delivery of the 8 Essential Qualities (8EQs),
- a particular emphasis on the development of ministry and mission with those in the 20s-30s age range in the parish. At least 50% of Vikki's time will be spent reaching this age range, including ministry on the new housing areas in Southam. Vikki will be accountable for this aspect of the work (funded by the Acceler8 project) to the leader of the 20s-30s work in the Diocese, and
- an emphasis on helping St James to become a 'resourcing church' for the Deanery and wider diocese. This will include financially and in the development of lay training in Southam available for the Deanery and even wider Diocese to access.

Vikki will not be responsible for mission and ministry at Ufton, which will become a wider Deanery responsibility. She will continue to live in the vicarage in Radford Semele with her family who will continue to worship at St Nicholas. For her first year Vikki will continue as a curate followed by three years as a fulltime stipendiary Interim Minister, subject to annual review.

As a church we have committed to:

- supporting Vikki as she leads the whole church into the change necessary to deliver the Diocesan Mission Purpose via the 8EQs,
- support the emphasis on 20s-30s ministry and the role of the church as a resourcing (rather than resourced church),
- paying all of Vikki's legitimate working expenses. Travel expenses (up to a limit of £3,000) from Radford Semele to Southam whilst on placement as a curate will be covered by St James, and whilst as an interim minister will be covered by the Diocese, and
- increasing parish share contributions by £5,000 per year over the four years, as a sign of commitment to long-term sustainability and becoming a resourcing church, recognising that others (Acceler8, Radford Semele, Bishop's Mission Fund) will also be financially investing in this next phase in the life of St James.

With the above plan in place a positive proposal will be put to the Diocesan Finance Group (DFG) that if the financial target as set out above is reached and all payments have been received by April 2020, the Diocese will 'write off' the £100,000 arrears of St James. It is interesting that at a PCC meeting in April 2015 Canon Simon Lloyd representing the Diocesan Finance Group accepted that the amount of unpaid parish share was demonstrably not payable given the circumstances of the church. This plan addresses that issue.

Since John's departure and we entered a time of vacancy I have been delighted with the way members of the church family have stepped forward to ensure that the church and the services we provide have continued to be delivered with both quality and professionalism. It is often quoted that in times of vacancy 'churches' and 'individuals' within those churches grow and we have seen positive evidence of this at St James. We can only look forward in anticipation of what God has in store for us....

The statement of the financial activities for the year is set out in this Annual Report together with the Treasurer's Report, see pages 11-17. guidance and assistance of our treasurer, Ruth Tresidder, we maintained a very strict control over church expenditure and fully met our agreed Parish Share commitment for 2015 of £25,806, although as previously stated this is well below the cost of a full-time stipendiary minister.

The full PCC met on twelve occasions during 2015, with an attendance rate of 85%, and included four extraordinary meetings. Of the four, at two the PCC considered the 8 Essential Qualities (8EQS) of Healthy Growing Churches and agreed that it would be beneficial for the whole church to complete a survey in accordance with the 8 EQs in order to determine a baseline for the church. The PCC also decided that we should await the outcome of the Deanery Pastoral Committee's review of the deanery structure before starting. A special meeting was held in March to consider how St James might celebrate VE Day and one in November to start considering those matters which would be impacted by the vacancy.

The PCC also agreed that following completion of a three month trial we should continue to hold one service, being communion, at 9.30am on the first Sunday of each month.

The PCC is supported in its duties by a Standing Committee, to enable urgent decisions which have been properly delegated to be taken between PCC meetings and a Fabric Committee to look after the church buildings, etc. The minutes and reports of their meetings were received by the full PCC, in particular the quinquennial inspection of the building, and discussed where necessary.

The PCC is fully aware of the risk factors involved in the running of church affairs and continues to ensure that all our properties are adequately insured, including public liability.

Mrs Elizabeth McBride, has again kindly agreed to examine the Accounts and the PCC is very grateful to her for the time she has spent on this.

The PCC is also grateful to Margaret Mumford for the smooth running of the church office and a particular vote of thanks goes to those volunteers who help cover the church office each Tuesday and Friday morning, and when Margaret is on leave. A special vote of thanks also goes to Ruth Tresidder who organises More volunteers are always welcome so if you would like to help please have a word with Ruth.

Copies of the PCC minutes are displayed on the noticeboard at the back of church after each meeting.

As you would expect, a lot of the detail of what is discussed at the PCC meetings is covered in the following reports. In addition detailed reports of other groups and activities associated with St James are set out in this Annual Report.

The members of the Parochial Church Council approved the reports for submission to the APCM on February 21 2016 which Barry Parker (Vice Chair) signed on their behalf.

Churchwarden's Report

Having served on the PCC for many years due to being a Reader at St James it has been very interesting to be also Churchwarden this year.

Little did I know that when I took on the role that it would be a year of such change. As one of St James's Deanery Synod reps I was aware that the Deanery had to reshape itself and that the Deanery Pastoral committee had spent many, many hours looking at how to structure ministry for the future in the face of the funding issues.

However it came as a great surprise to me and the PCC that other changes were then put forward by Archdeacon Morris Rodham and we learnt of the plan for Rev John Armstrong to move to minister at St John's Kenilworth.

As the only Churchwarden and the Reader I was initially concerned that my workload would greatly increase following John & Vicki's departure but we have such a good team with the PCC and other active members of St James, and everyone has worked together to maintain ministry at St James.

So whilst I have found myself doing new things - e.g. dealing with office and fabric matters, writing thought for the month, taking "Thanksgiving for Children" services etc., I have been so well supported and guided in my role as Churchwarden that it has not been as onerous a task as I feared. So thank you to everyone who has helped the novice Churchwarden!

Now as Church we know the outline of plans for the coming year and we welcome Vikki Bisiker to lead St James and I for one look forward to see further changes in which we can continue to work together to build up St James and fulfil our purpose to Worship God, Make Disciples and Transform our Community.

Treasurer's Report

Yet another year has gone by and we have been fortunate that the church has not incurred any major expenditure.

General income for 2015 was slightly lower than 2014 but planned income per month was higher and amounted to £2,437.77 compared with £2,200.11 in 2014. Loose plate collections and income from yellow envelopes decreased to £596.53 per month compared with £749.75 in the previous year, but, as noted in the Giving 2015 Report, this was partly offset by the increase in money contributed through the blue envelope scheme.

Our end of year balance in the General Account of £10,900.59 includes money retained to cover the cost of the 5 yearly electrical inspection that was undertaken in December 2015, invoice awaited, and £1,000 for two months insurance premium that is now collected over twelve months rather than by ten instalments in the past.

Significant items that need highlighting include:

- Sale of the Magic Lantern and slides that realised £465.16 after deduction of commission.
- A replacement mixer unit for the sound desk at a cost of £243.
- Annual maintenance/statutory checks on the gas boilers, lightning conductor, clock, fire extinguishers, PAT testing and 5 yearly tree inspection amounted to £1,755.
- Work on the north aisle, choir vestry, chancel and south and north porch roofs and downpipe replacement cost £2,200 after the VAT had been reclaimed through the Listed Places of Worship Grant Aid Scheme.
- £435 was spent on replacement of high level bulbs and 4 spotlights. Due to the height of the fittings contractors were required to undertake this work.
- Earlier in the year it was necessary to replace the churchyard skip with a second hand one at a cost of £300.

The PCC thank Southam Town Council for their continued support of including the churchyard grass cutting in their mowing contract and their paying for emptying the church skip throughout the year.

Looking ahead we had already committed to paying £27,096 towards our parish share for 2016 prior to the wonderful news that the Rev Vikki Bisiker is to join us in March. In order for us to have the benefit of Vikki's ministry in Southam we are required to provide an additional £5,000 to the diocese each year as well as Vikki's working expenses (not exceeding £3,000). In reality we need additional income of £125 per week to cover our costs. I appreciate we hope and pray that congregation numbers will increase over time but we must all very seriously consider whether our own present giving to St James is realistic.

I would like to thank everyone who contributes to our church finances especially all those who give to the church on a regular basis, whether by standing order, through our various envelopes schemes or through the collection plate every penny really does count.

NOTES RELATING TO 2015 ACCOUNTS

Breakdown of totals Receipts and Payments Account

<u>Income</u>

- All tax reclaimable giving from standing orders paid into bank account, weekly 1a numbered envelopes and yellow envelopes.
- Tax reclaimed from above and from the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme 1b (unrestricted) and from Special Appeals (restricted) from 1 October 2014 to 30 September 2015.
- Planned giving that may not qualify for tax relief and loose plate collections. 1c
- Unrestricted includes proceeds from Summer Fete and Christmas Fayre, one off 1d donations, income received for incidental charges at weddings and insertions in the Book of Remembrance. Restricted includes Bees Abroad, International, donations for the churchyard and church flowers.
- 1e Proceeds of sale of Magic Lantern and associated slides.
- 2a Restricted Wedding Fees in Advance may be carried over from one year to another. The deficit shown on this year's accounts is due to the fact that in 2015 more of the 2014 income was expended than was received in advance for weddings in 2016.

Expenditure

- Our contribution to Coventry Diocese. Other parishes within Southam Deanery 3a and other deaneries subsidised the Southam benefice by £19,622.
- 4a Clergy expenses and cost of Rectory telephone.
- 4b Candles, Communion Wine, etc.
- 4c Includes Music Licences for 2015, Music Group and audio/visual expenses.
- 4d Visiting laity undertaking funerals.
- 5a Salary and Tax for Administrator. The Office is manned on Tuesdays and Fridays by volunteers.
- 5b Rental, maintenance and ink for photocopier, stationery, book of remembrance.
- 5c Bank charges, fund raising and refreshment expenses and administration of weddings and funerals.
- 5d Rental of Church Office and associated utilities.
- Gas and Electricity supplies and Water rates for St James Church. 6a
- 6b Insurance of buildings, contents and public liability.
- 6c Routine maintenance including statutory testing of gas boilers, fire extinguishers, clock and lightning conductor, PAT testing, roof and valley repairs and replacement lighting.
- Both unrestricted and restricted expenditure relates to cost of a replacement skip 6d and the 5 yearly tree inspection undertaken in July 2015. We are grateful to Southam Town Council for including mowing and strimming the churchyard in their grass cutting contract and paying for emptying the skip.
- 7a Unrestricted includes donations to Southam Christmas Lights Association and a contribution to Southam Deanery. Restricted includes expenditure on Christmas and Easter flowers, International and Bees Abroad.
- 7b Unrestricted includes Thanksgiving and Baptism expenses and the cost of Christmas postcards. Restricted includes expenditure by Jolly J's, the Open the Book team and booklets for distribution at Christmas.

Accounts for Year Ended 31 December 2015

Independent Examiner's Report

The charity's trustees, that is, the members of St James, Southam PCC, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed. It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the 2011 Act;

I report on the accounts of St James' Church, Southam for the year ended 31 December 2015.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examine

Giving Report

It is wonderful that the vast majority of our income is now eligible for tax relief, so that we can receive 25p from HM Revenue & Customs for virtually every £1 donated.

At the beginning of 2015 a total of 31 people paid by standing order into the church bank account, this reduced to 29 by the end of December. Giving by this method amounted to £20,121.92 – an increase of £1,025 over the previous year. During the year twelve people donated through the blue envelope scheme and a total of £5,669.85 was given by this method, an increase of £1,341.90 over the previous year.

77 people contributed to the church by yellow envelope, of these ten gave on a regular basis. Total giving by this method (including one off gift aid donations) amounted to £4,046.31, a decrease of £1,053.97 from 2014; this is offset by the increase in people contributing by the blue envelope scheme.

We received gift aid of £8,554.75 from HM Revenue & Customs, this is an increase of £178.42 over the previous year. Tax is recovered in arrear and covers the period 1 October 2014 to 30 September 2015.

During the year the number of people who are non-taxpayers who give on a regular basis decreased by one to eight but income increased by £485 to £3,461.50.

Fabric Committee Report

The purpose of this report is to highlight achievements of the past year and set out proposals for the immediate future. Failures are also mentioned to remind everyone at St James that the fabric committee needs serious revitalisation if the church building and the surroundings are to be maintained to a safe working standard in the future. I can only repeat a couple of sentences from last year's report - 'The fact that we do not have a fabric secretary and are unable to find anyone to undertake the role.' (Not through lack of trying for the last two years), and 'Neither do we have any members who now wish to take on future project management'. (Several of us would be only too pleased to hand over the reins to new people). Only one fabric meeting took place during the year on 25 November.

The completed projects for 2015 were the repairs to the tearoom/toilet roof to stop the water getting in and general gutter/valley cleaning and roof tile replacement - again to keep the building dry. The only other item was the Rector's vestry floor inspection which was carried out in September which resulted in a proposed replacement floor report being sent to PCC. (This was agreed to proceed). Two statutory five yearly inspections took place during 2015, the full electrical test (results not yet to hand as at 22 January 2016) and the churchyard tree inspection. The latter item requires work to be carried out to a number of trees and PCC agreed we proceed with the necessary planning paperwork (this is ongoing).

A report on proposed internal and external church building projects was passed to the PCC in January 2015 covering the period up to 2020. However, these all need new people and money to carry them through and therefore no decisions have been taken as yet.

The churchyard skip (which had rusted away after almost 30 years) was replaced with a second-hand one. We changed to a cheaper (and more efficient) fire extinguisher testing firm during the year. The sound desk mixer failed just before Easter and had to be replaced and then the CD unit failed just before Christmas (replaced on 21 January 2016). Several small jobs were undertaken during the year; the (stolen) kissing gate replaced into the recreation ground; the bier house door padlock failed in the locked position and had to be ground off and a number of trees needed minor trimming. Due to a burglary adjacent to the church office some additional security measures are under consideration. Thanks must go to a number of volunteers who have helped during the year with hedge trimming and clearing up tree trimmings also litter picking and bin emptying around the churchyard.

Finally, the world has changed (strictly this is 2016). On the first of January a new online faculty application system will now apply to every diocese in the country. (This only came to light at the last moment when making the application for the new Rector's vestry floor a few days ago). I thought the C of E had moved from the medieval to the 21st century, perhaps it has, but I have not. I failed with the online system and did it longhand in the end, (as in the past). The immediate future is therefore just to clear faculty and other consents to allow the Rector's vestry floor project and the tree work to proceed in 2016.

No other forward new projects are on the books. John Tresidder - Verger

Deanery Synod Report

The Deanery Synod provides the PCC with an important link between the parish and the wider structures of the church.

Two members of the PCC sit on the Deanery Synod, Stephen Adams and Barry Parker. Barry Parker was also appointed as the Deanery Synod's Lay Chair during the year and is a member of the Deanery Standing and Pastoral Committee. Margo Grant, also a member of the PCC, sits on the Deanery Synod as a Diocesan Synod representative.

In June 2015 Rev Martin Green stepped up as Acting Area Dean to cover for Rev Captain Craig Groocock who stepped back due to personal reasons and who has now officially resigned as Area Dean after four years. At the end of the year Rev Bob Clucas retired from parish ministry and Rev John Armstrong completed his ministry at Southam and Ufton to take up a new role in Kenilworth.

In May 2015 the Deanery Pastoral Committee presented its draft pastoral scheme for the Southam Deanery for consultation and consideration across the parishes. The initial draft reflected and attempted to address the financial challenges facing the deanery, the retirement of incumbent clergy and the desire to capitalise on positive developments within growing parishes.

There was an acceptance that the proposals were not without some risk. Following positive discussions it was agreed that the parishes of Offchurch, Hunningham, Weston-Under-Wetherley and Wappenbury be united. matter of clergy cover was subject to ongoing discussion. In addition, a decision by the Feldon group of churches to appoint two House for Duty posts each covering three parishes was progressing.

The Deanery Synod also received regular Deanery Mission updates together with reports and updates from the Diocesan Synod and General Synod.

St James C of E Primary School, Southam

2015 has seen great change in the staffing and leadership at St James School. Once on his own and once with some friends to do a Comedy and Carols evening. His style was so easy and friendly and his comedy both gentle and incisive, and again he had us roaring with laughter. He told his story too, in a relaxed, easy fashion, drawing people into a place where talking about faith was natural.

Steve Parsons drove down from Cheshire with a guitar and a keyboard to perform a simply stunning evening of music and testimony. He works part time as an Assemblies of God minister, and his story flowed around his powerful songs and challenging lyrics. People left that night having felt they had encountered God, yet without anything really being preached.

There are two important lessons we have learnt from these and other events:

- that events need to be of the highest quality so that people are confident in inviting friends, and

During the past year, particularly whilst the 'Town enhancement' scheme was being implemented, the location of the Farmers Market has varied. This resulted in fewer people shopping at the Farmers Market and consequently it did not continue to be a viable proposition for some stall holders to continue to come. Some were only just managing to 'break even'. When the Farmers Market moved to the car park of the Factory Shop the footfall reduced further and it seemed our original vision of praying on the street had been side lined to the edge of the shopping area.

In October when John and Vicki Armstrong announced that they would be leaving St. James Church, it was felt that, at least for the time being, the prayer stall in its present form had come to an end.

Over the six years the Prayer Stall has been running we have seen God working in the lives of people locally. We still visit the Market to maintain contact and friendship with the remaining stall holders and still help by putting up and taking down their advertising signs around the town.

We thank God for the privilege of serving Him in this way and wait to see what opportunities He might open up in the future.

Bees Abroad in Kenya

BEE PRODUCTS ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT PROJECT (BPED)

It has been nearly three years since Bees Abroad secured major funding from the UK Department for International Aid (DFID) for a three-year project to alleviate poverty through advancing beekeeping skills and supporting bioconservation and bio-enterprise in the arid and semi-arid land (ASAL) in the Kenyan district of Laikipia.

The project, the Bees products enterprise development project (BPED), has been

overseen by Mary and John Home and has been a great success. So much so that Mary and John are returning to Kenya for two weeks at the beginning of February 2016 to work on potential funding for a further three years.

What has been achieved?

Project Outcome: 900 pastoralist and agro-pastoral households in the Arid and Semi-Arid Land of Kenya in Laikipia County and Parts of Lower Samburu County including a proportion headed by Most Vulnerable groups to diversify livelihoods and increase their income

Key Achievements

- Recruited and actively working with 1245 beekeeping households all are applying the skills acquired
- 574 households are now owning at least 5 individual owned hives
- 523 households have increased household income by more than 15% from a baseline average of £89.93 per month to an average of £102.85 per month
- 971 households making hive products for sale
- 458 households have planted at least 5 new bee friendly trees/shrubs
- Beekeepers in the area of operation organized into four cooperative societies where two are already registered and the other are in the process of being registered. An existing dormant beekeeping cooperative has also been revived through the project
- Four business plans developed for the four cooperatives (proposed and registered)
- Bee products market survey undertaken and the findings used to establish 15 regular outlets
- 11 beekeepers groups have been facilitated to acquire standardization mark from KEBS trading standard and can now sell through shops

Challenges

- Climatic variation leading to frequent unpredicted droughts
- Limited financial resources to cater for all the demands from existing and prospective beekeepers
- Terrain and vastness of the project area sometimes limiting effective follow up

Lessons Learnt

- Bee keeping is a potential alternative source of livelihood for the pastoral communities in the Arid and Semi-Arid Lands if well harnessed
- Although beekeeping is seemingly a male domain, women, if given a chance, can also actively engage and adopt the same The numbers are 51% women and 49% men are involved
- An integrated approach to beekeeping is necessary for sustainability.
