ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

20 MARCH 2011

Vestry Meeting for the purpose of electing two Churchwardens

- **1)** Rev John Armstrong opened with prayer.
- 2) Two nominations, duly proposed and seconded, had been received for the following: Pat Adams & Michael Kitchen-Hurle. There being no other nominations the above were duly elected for the following year.
- **3)** Rev. John Armstrong prayed for them on behalf of the whole church.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting: Members Present 33

1) Apologies for absence

Apologies for absence had been received from: Jan Ford, John and Mary Home, Derrick and Rose Evans, Jenny Thorne, Tony Brown, David Houghton and John Cherry.

2) Minutes of last APCM

These were proposed as being a correct record by Hilary Crosby and Vicki Armstrong subject to three spelling errors re: Jill Parker, Rachael Powell & Maurice Crutchlow and signed by the chairman.

3) Matters arising from the minutes

There were no matters arising.

4) Reports

Rev. John Armstrong apologised that the booklet of reports had been delayed and that the membership had not had the time to peruse them. In the circumstances it was agreed that they be "accepted and noted." However, all were encouraged to read them as they gave a very good snapshot of church life.

5) Deanery Synod Representatives

St James, under the diocesan rules, is allowed three representatives to Deanery Synod. However, all such have to be re-instated by a formal vote this year. The current representatives are willing to stand, these are: Margo Grant, Janet Pratt & Bryan Pratt. There being no other offers the above were elected.

6) Appointment of the Independent Examiner of the Accounts Elizabeth McBride is willing to continue in this role and therefore, there being no other offer, was re-elected to the post.

7) Election of PCC Members

There existed two vacancies for the PCC and two nominations had been received, duly proposed and seconded for David Baxter and Brett Justice and therefore they were duly elected. It was noted that Ceri Hewitt had stood down due to family pressures.

(At this point a question was raised by Malcolm Monkhouse on the ratio of ex-officio members of the PCC to elected members. It was pointed out that the latter was a majority).

8) Re-election of sidespersons en-bloc

These were approved and re-elected being proposed by Rev. John Armstrong and seconded by Bryan Pratt.

9) Any Other Business

- a) Ruth Tresidder mentioned the length of baptismal services and quantity of candidates which could render the service as impersonal. This was noted by Rev. John Armstrong.

Annual Report for 2011 cont.

The PCC co-operates with the Rev. John Armstrong in promoting, within the parish, the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical.

The PCC is a charity excepted from registration with the Charity Commission in the Southam Deanery in the Diocese of Coventry. Members of the PCC are either ex officio or elected by the annual parochial church meeting in accordance with the Church Representation Rules.

The PCC has no connected charities.

The PCC employs one part-time member of staff.

No member of the PCC, or any connected person, has benefited financially from the PCC. Expenses incurred on behalf of the PCC have been reimbursed.

In addition to the above, during 2011 Ceri Hewitt was a member and John Tresidder a co-opted member of the PCC, both standing down in March 2011.

The PCC also has maintenance responsibilities for the fabric of the church and of the churchyard.

There were 128 members on the 2011 Church Electoral Roll of whom 13 are not resident within the parish (2012:128 with 13 not resident within the parish).

The average Sunday attendance was 82, but numbers increased at the various festivals and for baptism and thanksgiving services.

The statement of the financial activities for the year is set out in this Annual Report together with the Treasurer's Report, see pages 13 - 18. With regard to 2011, £25,250 was paid towards the Parish Share of £38,987, a shortfall of £13,737. The PCC has been mindful that we at St James have not been able to meet our Parish Share for a number of years and, for 2011, with the guidance and assistance of our treasurer, Ruth Tresidder, has maintained strict control over church expenditure in order to maximise the amount of parish share paid. In view of the financial situation the PCC agreed that a stewardship campaign should be held, looking not only at what is given financially, but also what is given in time and talents. In view of John Armstrong's sabbatical the PCC agreed to hold the campaign in March 2012.

The full PCC met on 14 occasions during 2011 with an attendance rate of 77%. Additional to this, the Council also made some decisions by email. Copies of the minutes are displayed on the noticeboard at the back of church after each meeting. Included in the 14 were two extraordinary meetings. These were held on 20 March 2011, to approve the accounts for 2010, and on 16 April 2011, to consider the relocation of the church office. Also included in the 14 was an away half-day held on 28 May 2011 to consider the St James Vision, Stewardship and the structure of the PCC.

The PCC is supported in its duties by a Standing Committee, to enable urgent decisions which have been properly delegated to be taken between PCC meetings, and a Fabric Committee to look after the church buildings, etc. The minutes of their meetings were received by the full PCC and discussed where necessary.

As a result of discussions at the away half-day each PCC meeting, which opens and closes in prayer, now has a standard agenda comprising:

One of the key decisions taken during the year with the most visible impact was the agreement to relocate the church office from the Rectory to new premises at 74D Coventry Street. Encouraged by the Diocese that the office should not be in the rectory and in anticipation of the sabbatical, the PCC agreed to lease new premises. Formal occupation took place on 1 July 2011. Our thanks go to John and Ruth Tresidder for all their hard work in readying the premises for occupation. The PPC agreed that the advantages in the move outweighed the relatively small additional annual running cost of the new office.

During the year the PCC also spent a great deal of its time considering the Church Vision as presented to the last APCM. To that end we have agreed to establish and consolidate core subgroups for all church ministry, develop our social, outreach and fundraising opportunities into the community and develop our pastoral framework for the church. This work is ongoing.

The PCC is fully aware of the risk factors involved in the running of church affairs and continues to ensure that all our properties are adequately insured, including public liability.

Mrs Elizabeth McBride, has again kindly agreed to examine the Accounts and the PCC is very grateful to her for the time she has spent on this.

As you would expect, a lot of the detail of what is discussed at the PCC meetings is covered in the following reports. In addition detailed reports of other groups and activities associated with St James are set out in this Annual Report.

The members of the Parochial Church Council approved this report and the Rev. John Armstrong has signed it on their behalf.

Rector's Report

On two occasions during the past year we have been reminded of just how much goes on in the everyday life of our church – not just because it is made up of a fair number of people of all ages, many of whose lives are complex in themselves, but also because our God "neither slumbers nor sleeps" (Psalm 121)!

The most recent reminder has come when preparing reports for the annual meeting, and the earlier in a series of meetings with key members of the church when, in making plans in preparation for our sabbatical we had to think through all the events we thought would definitely be taking place whilst we were away as well as saying, "If this happens, then this is what you will need to do ..."

Being freed from church duties for three months for the first time was a privilege as well as something which is supposed to happen every seven years to stop vicars burning out! We knew that St. James Church would be in good hands because we could not only trust the Lord but also trust you. God is continuing to build his church and he has been putting in place men and women with skills and gifts who want to work together for God's kingdom. Our PCC Secretary, Treasurer and Churchwarden work tirelessly on our behalf (well, they do get tired, but you know what I mean!). We have an excellent PCC and, as you will discover when reading through these reports, we are developing groups with leaders who are responsible for vital areas of church life, from families to (church) fabric. Even though a good part of the sabbatical did not turn out to be the refreshment and rest it might have been, we were blessed by you with the freedom to deal with urgent family matters and we thank you for this and for all you have done.

In a church there is a place for everyone and there is something for everyone to do. It took some time to come up with the material in our "Welcome Pack" which you can find at the back of church and one of the sections of this pack is entitled "Getting Involved". Reading that will give you an idea of what there is to do! It's important for all of us to know how we can function as part of the community of the church, and to be part of ensuring that we together do what God wants us to do.

In March 2012 Stephen Adams and John are speaking on the subject of "Stewardship", wanting to explore with you how we can best be part of "the body of Christ" and ensuring that "the body" is well maintained and going where it's supposed to be going! We need to be efficient, engaged and equipped, and this means thinking about time, talents and money. We have big and pressing challenges in the areas of human and financial resources but we are moving in the right direction, aiming to move from "red" to black" so we are properly equipped to "worship God, make new disciples and transform our community".

Please accept our thanks to all of you who faithfully and reliably serve in a variety of ways in the family of the church, whether in the context of Sunday or weekday services or in the many and various branches of church life during the week. Thanks are due to any who are actively training others on the job so they can be equipped; after all, church is an organism rather than an organisation!

Many thanks to our splendid team who contribute their skills week after week to all times and types of worship, to our excellent preachers and worship leaders. A special thanks to two individuals whom I shall name (at risk of not mentioning others!). One is Ralph Trollope, who has laid down his responsibilities as Gift Aid Officer after many years: thank you for your devoted service, Ralph. The other is John Tresidder, who, though he still seems as busy as ever, has wisely and gradually been handing over the job of secretary to the Fabric Committee to David Baxter. John's thorough record-keeping is exemplary and as we thank John and Ralph we also pray for David and for Ruth (as she takes on Gift Aid) that they too will be blessed in their work and service.

The new Church Office opened on 1 July 2011 and Vicki and I would like to repeat our thanks to you for responding to this challenge. Many thanks to Margaret Mumford for her continuing work as Administrator, for her good nature and organisation. Many thanks also to the new band of volunteers who ensure that the office at No. 74D is staffed every weekday morning! We already hold PCC meetings there and Jill Parker's crafty group is meeting there on a weekday afternoon. What about the rest of the week? Here's another opportunity for some creative stewardship of a resource

Thanks to all officers and members of the PCC, of all the committees and particularly to our Churchwardens, Pat and, until the end of August, Mike, for all your faithful hard work. Vicki and I would like to express our appreciation of the

teamwork of all who ensured the continuation of the ministry of St. James in our absence.

I cannot finish this report without thanking all the members of the PCC: They supported me and over this relatively short period developed a real sense of team – they even laughed at some of my attempts at humour! Seriously, we had fun as well as working hard and I wouldn't have missed the opportunity for anything because we all knew that we were jointly working for God in our small way.

Churchwarden's Report

As we reflect on the past year and the life and ministry of St. James' Church we have much to be thankful for. We continue to enjoy the support and commitment of many able and loyal members. We thank God for His faithfulness to us as a fellowship of His people here in Southam.

Fabric: As a Church we are indebted to the hard work of the Fabric Committee who are constantly working to maintain the structure of our building with the minimum of outlay. We are very fortunate that we have many skilled and willing workers in that group. During the past year they have worked on many different tasks. Some regular and on-going, some unexpected, inconvenient and challenging – for example battling with wind and heavy rain on the roof in the

small hours to keep the building watertight after the lead had been removed! Thank you all for your commitment and hard work. We couldn't do without you.

Finance: Our treasurer Ruth Tresidder has worked efficiently and tirelessly throughout the year to minimise our outlay and to maximise the amount of money we give to the diocese in the form of the Parish Share. However, in spite of Ruth's excellent 'Housekeeping', there is still a shortfall £13,000.

Ministry: John continues to lead the Church supported faithfully by his wife Vicki. Stephen continues to serve as a Reader along with an increasing number of gifted members who are willing and able to take services. We are grateful to the Lord for the commitment of these people.

During the autumn (1 September – 30 November) John and Vicki took a muchneeded Sabbatical. During the Sabbatical it was wonderful to see the way in which different Church members worked together in order to maintain the life and vitality of St. James. Teamwork at it's best. Thank you all! Another very positive by-product of the Sabbatical was the opening of St. James Church Office on Coventry Street. (Particular thanks go to the Tresidders, Parkers and other members who worked so hard to make this a reality.) On the days our Church administrator is not working the office is manned by very willing and able volunteers. The office is also proving ideal for PCC and other meetings. God is so good.

'More', the Church youth group run by John and Vicki continues to include both 'Churched' and 'Un-Churched' young people who enjoy having fun and praying together whilst growing in their understanding of the Bible.

Access into the local schools continues to go well, via assemblies, supporting aspects of Christianity in lessons and also lunchtime meetings at Southam College.

The Prayer Stall is very much part of the monthly Farmers Market and relationships with the other stall-holders are good.

The Granny Wagon continues to serve hot drinks to young folk on a Friday evening. This too is very much appreciated, both by the youth and their parents.

Jolly J's is well established now as a weekly meeting place for Mums, Carers and their little ones. Jenny and Laura have created a very relaxed atmosphere for everyone to enjoy.

Messy Church, headed by Jo, has continued to provide a fantastic opportunity to introduce Jesus to families who wouldn't normally go to Church.

Special Thanks: Sadly, it was necessary for Mike Kitchen-Hurle to resign from his role as Church Warden. It has been great working alongside Mike for the past 2¹/₂ years and I have missed him; his hard work, dedication and sense of humour. Thank you Mike for all you have done for St. James' Church.

Future: As we move forward into another year in the life of the church each one of us has a part to play. Let us be encouraged by the words of the apostle Paul in 1 Corinthians 15:58 to 'Stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord because you know that your labour in the Lord is not in vain.'

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>

We must be thankful that our unrestricted giving to St James in 2011 increased by \pounds 4,500 on the previous year. We have always been generous whenever specific appeals have been made for particular projects but we do not always take on board the everyday costs of our parish.

We managed to pay \pounds 4,250 more towards our 2011 Parish Share (than we paid in 2010) as well as move the church office into 74D Coventry Street.

I appreciate there is a shortfall of £13,737 in paying our parish share but the PCC felt that it was important to provide a church presence in the town especially during John Armstrong's sabbatical when we would have had no access to the Rectory. I wish to say a big thank you to all those who donated funds towards the set up costs of the office. It is hoped that the office can be maintained as it ensures we have a presence in the town irrespective of whether there is an incumbent in post or not.

Our income last year, including statutory fees (for weddings and funerals), amounted to $\pm 1,026$ per week whereas, to pay our parish share and other outgoings in full we needed an income of $\pm 1,286$ per week.

I would like to thank all those people who support the church on a regular basis – their contributions amounted to £806 per week.

We have reduced Margaret, our Administrator's hours, from 2½ days to 3 mornings and this saving is partly offsetting the cost of renting 74D Coventry Street. The office is being manned 2 mornings a week by volunteers. I wish to thank all those people who ensure the office is open 5 mornings a week.

Unfortunately some of our costs are inevitable, insurance costs us £116 per week, and our gas, electricity and water charges are around £65 per week.

I hope our Stewardship campaign being held throughout March will help us generate more funds on a regular basis. Without the commitment of our church members we will not be able to continue God's work in Southam in an efficient and loving manner in the future.

Breakdown of totals Income and Expenditure Account

<u>Income</u>

Independent Examiner's Report

Independent examiner's report to the Parochial Church Council of St James, Southam

I report on the accounts of St James' Church, Southam for the year ended 31 December 2011.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

Gift Aid Report

Ralph Trollope has been Gift Aid Secretary for nearly 30 years and towards the end of 2011 Ralph decided he wished to retire from the post. I should like to thank Ralph for all his hard work over the years.

I was appointed Gift Aid Secretary at the PCC meeting on 30 November; I will endeavour to continue the good work undertaken by Ralph.

2011 began by 24 people paying by Standing Order directly into the church bank account. During the year 5 people changed their giving to this method. A total of $\pounds 16,067.92$ was received in this way.

A total of twelve people began the year paying by "Blue envelopes", during the year one family changed to paying by Standing Order. Regular giving by this method amounted to £5,623.00.

During the year 76 people gave through "Yellow envelopes" and this raised $\pm 5,328.06$ for the church. Eleven of these people gave on a regular basis by this method.

Before the end of 2011 £7,119.61 was recovered from HMRC for gift aid for the period 6 April 2010 to 5 April 2011. It is hoped that we can receive the money from HMRC on a quarterly basis so that by the end of 2012 only the last quarter of the year (September – December) will be outstanding. This is very much reliant on the speed that HMRC process the paperwork.

I should like to thank everyone who contributes to the work of the church by Gift Aid, although ancillary relief finished in April 2011(when we continued to receive an additional 3p for every £1 donated) we still receive 25p for every pound given to St James.

If you are a taxpayer and putting cash into the collection please remember to complete a yellow envelope so that we can increase our income with the help of the tax man.

Hopefully by the time of the Church Annual Meeting we will have received some positive responses from the Stewardship campaign that will increase Gift Aid in the future.

Fabric Committee Report

In the last year the fabric committee has been active in a number of matters, both planned and in reaction to events.

Church Office

2011 saw the establishment of a separate office for the church, located at 74D Coventry Road. This satisfies the requirement to move the office out of the Rectory and also provides St James with an increased presence in town as well as a valuable asset as it is useful for meetings and other such uses.

Thanks must be extended to all those who spent many hours planning the office move, arranging the lease and supply of utilities and in organizing the move to the new office.

Theft, Vandalism and Damage

There have been several incidents of vandalism and malicious damage to church property throughout the year including damage to notice boards and the roof (see below):

North Aisle Roof

An attempt was made in August to steal some of the lead from the roof of the North Aisle. This has caused damage to some of the lead as well as the guttering and some water also entered the Church as it was raining heavily on the night of the attempt. The Committee would like to thank all of those involved for responding in the middle of the (very wet) night to minimise the damage caused. Thanks should also go to the anonymous person who raised the alarm.

A temporary repair has been made to the roof and the guttering etc. has been repaired/replaced. A permanent repair is still required and the possibility of using a less valuable and/or more easily secured material is being explored.

A claim was made on the Church's insurance policy to cover the works conducted.

Subsequent damage

It later came to light that during the attempted theft, the lead which had been stripped and dropped from the roof has damaged a gulley which carries water away from the wall of the church. Ingress of water has resulted and a separate claim will need to be made to the insurers to have this rectified.

Church Lighting and Flood Lighting

The Fabric Committee have been active, and are continuing to be so, in investigating alternative lighting for the interior of the church, particularly to replace the high level lights in the Nave which are old, inefficient and difficult/dangerous to change bulbs.

Similarly the Fabric Committee are investigating the possibility, cost and implications of floodlighting the exterior of the church, at the request of the PCC. The objective is to provide a source of income from allowing people to 'sponsor'

a night's lighting of the Church. The addition of security lighting is also being investigated.

Timber Casing in the Belfry

The timber casing that housed the drop weights for the old clock mechanism has been removed as the final part of the works to automate the clock.

Trees

Following wind damage to a large horse chestnut tree (near the Bier House), an inspection alerted the Fabric Committee to the fact that the tree was diseased and unsafe. The tree was safely and successfully removed with all of the relevant permission.

Southern Entrance

The Southam Civic Ideas Forum has funding to replace the old cast iron gates at the South entrance to the churchyard (top of steps on Warwick Road). They have progressed designs, gone to public consultation and gained planning consent. They subsequently have made an application for a Faculty to carry out this work. This application has stalled because of objections from the Victorian Society.

Ongoing Maintenance

North Doors

The North Doors have been planed at the bottom and re-hung to prevent them from catching on the stone.

Blocking Drain

The drain from the toilet continues to be a maintenance issue, frequently blocking due to the age and roughness of the pipes and the lack of fall between the church and the manhole. To assist in maintaining the free running of the drain we would ask that all users of the Church cooperate in being careful as to what is discarded in the drain/toilet.

Roof Repairs

Some repairs have been made to the roof above the vestry and tea room and toilet to help maintain water tightness.

Chancel Repair Liability

Finally thanks are extended to Mary Williams and John Tresidder for their efforts in researching the churches situation with regards to chancel repair liability. This involved some painstaking research through various archives and getting to grips with some quite complex legal requirements. The fabric committee were subsequently able to recommend that the PCC acknowledge that it knows of no chancel repair liability.

<u>Audio Visual</u>

Messy Church

Messy Church in Southam (Deanery) was set up with the intention of being/becoming a fresh expression of church in 2009. It has formed part of my primary placement for my training towards Ordained Pioneer Ministry since September 2010.

Our activities include crafts, food, games, songs, Bible teaching and learning about Jesus, all in a relaxed, fun way. It hopes to provide families with some quality time together. Messy Church meets monthly on alternating Saturday mornings and Tuesdays after school in the Craven Lane Hall (aka Welfare Hut).

Messy Church has a committed team of volunteers derived mostly, but certainly not exclusively, from members of St James Church. We have said goodbye (temporary I hope) to Jenny Thorne as she has returned to teaching this year and to John and Cynthia Cherry also. There is also an excellent prayer support team in operation. My thanks go to all of you for all your hard work, commitment and prayer.

The families attending Messy Church live in Southam and in several of the surrounding villages, especially Napton. Many are also involved to varying degrees in other churches. Messy Church has made contact with 19 unchurched families in total (i.e. those that don't attend any other church).

During the year we decided to change the way that Messy Church is described and advertised from 'for families with primary school children' to 'all-age families welcome.' This was to overcome the potential for some families to feel excluded and solved the issue about what to do with families whose children have grown beyond primary school age. Messy Church is attended by a few secondary school children with their families and many preschool children also.

Messy Church received a grant from the Diocesan Mission Fund this year for purchasing necessary equipment. This has meant that we have been able to return/replace borrowed items and to improve the way Messy Church runs and the welcome we are able to offer. This grant has been allocated for specific items that are still in the process of being purchased.

The Craven Lane Hall committee have informed me that they have received a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund in the order of $\pounds 200,000$. This means they will be able to completely renovate the hut which will greatly benefit the whole of the community. It also means that Messy Church will need to use another venue while the work is being carried out – probably September time 2012.

Thank you to everyone who supports Messy Church financially.

<u>Jolly J's</u>

Jolly J's is a coffee and play session for parents/ carers with pre-school children and babies. It takes place in church on Monday mornings between 10 o'clock and 11 o'clock in term-time. It was set up and is run by Jenny Baxter and Laura Seago with the support of a number of helpers. It began on 9 May 2011, and so has been running for just over two terms. The aim of the group is to provide an informal café-type atmosphere for mums/dads/carers to meet and chat over coffee while the children play.

The initial start-up cost was about £500. A Nespresso coffee machine was purchased with coffee capsules, enabling us to provide real coffee shop style coffee. Other purchases included: a CD player, a set of white mugs, baby

beakers, plastic beakers, rugs, cushions, a baby mat, storage jars and boxes. In addition to the start-up costs furniture for a doll's house (donated by one of the mums) was purchased. A number of new and nearly new toys were also donated. Start-up costs were funded by the restricted account for children under five.

Initially there was a charge for tea/coffee plus cake of £1.50 with free squash and biscuits. Volunteers kindly provided homemade cakes each week. However, cakes were not always what people wanted, and so homemade biscuits/cup cakes are now provided each week, with mums also volunteering to make them. The charge has now been revised and it is currently £1 for tea/coffee plus biscuits and squash. The accounts are updated each week. The petty cash total on 12 January 2012 is £119.27. The total income up to this date is £173.50 and expenditure £54.23. Money is spent on the ongoing running costs of the group, e.g. milk, squash, Christmas party food, particularly coffee capsules which need to be ordered in bulk. The Christmas party was a great success and each child was given a book. The books were paid for with money from the restricted account for children.

Numbers at the group vary each week, ranging from two to eleven adults and three to 15 children. More recently, numbers have been steadier, with on average five to ten adults and eight to 13 children each week. Different people come each week and people have been coming back, and so overall there is a good number of people using the group. There is now a link with Southam Children's Centre and Jolly J's is listed in their termly programme. Jolly J's is also using the toy library at the Children's Centre so that a wider range of toys is available for the children.

The support of everyone at church has been wonderful and Jolly J's is certainly growing. We would like to thank everyone who has made cakes and has come to help each week. To continue the success of Jolly J's we need to build up the team of helpers and to continue to advertise in Southam so that more people are aware of Jolly J's. We also intend to ask for feedback from the group to see if there is anything we could do differently to improve the group.

Impact Youth Group

Impact Youth Group continues to meet weekly on Friday lunchtimes in Southam College. The group currently has six to eight regular members who are mostly non-Christians and not part of any church or church youth group. The group members are mostly girls in years nine and ten (age 14-15) who represent several of the villages in Southam Deanery. There are two boys who attend occasionally. The Impact group has formed part of my primary placement for my training towards Ordained Pioneer Ministry.

Impact is a recognised group within the school, playing an important part in its diversity and community cohesion and contributes to its provision for spiritual development of pupils; helping the school to meet its Ofsted requirements. I have an excellent relationship with the school.

Our topics for discussion this year have included questions about other faiths, worship and idols, marriage and sex, death and gossip. I take the agenda for Impact from the questions the girls are asking and help them to see what the Bible has to say to address these issues particularly in the light of today's society. Some members have found this quite challenging!

We continue to share our lunch together, pray together and have fun together. The group has provided a safe place and support for a few girls who have been going through difficult times at home and school.

Two girls are also members of MORE Youth Group including one who no longer attends Impact because she has moved to another school.

<u>He*Brews</u>

During the first six months of 2011 He*Brews continued to operate out of the Coffee Cup Café every Thursday evening between 7.30pm and 9.30pm. The numbers of youngsters dropping in for a drink and chat varied but, unfortunately, remained quite small. It was also particularly noticeable that the numbers of youngsters 'hanging around' the lych gate fell away over this period. With the lighter evenings and warmer weather it was quite clear that sitting in a very warm café was not appealing....

As we said in our report last year, despite the youth work that is going on we, in Southam, are still in the early days of developing relationships with the youngsters. It is only by creating those relationships and 'earning the right to be heard' can we fully understand how we can begin to challenge lifestyle and, hopefully, start to make a difference.

As a result of the continuing poor attendance a decision to not re-open He*Brews after the summer holidays was taken by the He*Brews team of volunteers. Dave Wise was informed and is still very supportive of youth outreach and the offer of the use of his café is still there.

We are also mindful of other youth outreach initiatives by a number of agencies across Southam, in particular accommodation at the Graham Adams Centre previously used by Warwickshire County Council's for its youth club, which has closed due to the local authority spending cuts. We will continue to monitor opportunities as they arise and consider how best He*Brews can make a contribution.

Most of the group members led at least one session and at the end of the year agreed that it had been an interesting series. Some of the time is spent catching up on news from group members and praying for one another. We have also welcomed Vicki to the group, and Jo to tell us about her training and future plans as she knew them then.

Church Liaison

Deanery Synod

St. James Representatives: Margo Grant, Bryan Pratt, Janet Pratt and John Armstrong

The Bridges Group celebrated the second anniversary of its formation, joining Napton, Stockton and Lower Shuckburgh with Priors Marston, Priors Hardwick and Wormleighton. The Rev. Michael Greig made a presentation to Synod, describing progress and challenges in the multi-parish benefice. Amongst activities mentioned was the **Marriage Preparation Course** which is kindly made open to all parishes of the Deanery; this will need new leaders and helpers in coming years.

Area Dean - The Rev. John Armstrong tendered his resignation as Area Dean as from Easter 2011, in order better to be able to address the financial situation at Southam. The clergy have continued to work together and await the licensing of the Rev. Craig Groocock as successor.

Deanery Programme - A new rolling programme of work in the Deanery has been prepared to follow the Diocesan Vision, commencing September 2011 with the first of three meetings on "Worshipping God"; four will follow on "Making New Disciples" and then four on "Transforming Communities"; all of these Thursday deanery meetings will be open to everyone in the deanery. As the greater part of synod meetings will be taken up with these topics, it has been agreed that the "business" elements will be, to the greater extent, dealt with by the Standing Committee, with decisions reported to the main meetings and discussion only held of matters considered by all to be of direct importance. The Bob Clucas made a thought-provoking, engaging and humorous Rev. presentation entitled "Need-Orientated Worship – Church for the Un-Churched," and the Rev. Canon David Stone spoke in December on his role as Precentor at Coventry Cathedral, on the subject of worship and music, under the title "Music to God's ears - developing a breadth of music for worship".

General Synod - The Rev. Ruth Walker had recently been elected as a representative and reports to Deanery Synod on meetings of General Synod and has given suggestions as to how we might engage with General Synod, too.

The Deanery Festival – "Out of the Blue" was held on 17– 19 June 2011 at the Warwickshire Exhibition Centre. Prior to the weekend, Graham Nunn, a Church Army Officer and Children's Missioner and his assistant visited eight schools in the Deanery, in preparation for the children's Praise Party, which drew around 300 people. An evening with Adrian and Bridget Plass was well attended on the Friday as were the concerts on the Saturday. Schools performed as did the Pilgrim Puppets. There was a full range of stalls, games and side shows. Around 250 attended a celebration Communion service on Sunday 19 led by Bishop John. The event raised over £9,000 towards the restoration work on St. Nicholas, Radford Semele.

Finance – Despite demographic research showing that Southam Deanery is *supposed* to be one of the richest deaneries in the Diocese, a number of churches continue to struggle with making ends meet. The Friends of Southam Deanery account had paid the arrears for 2010 amounting to £3,295 (for parishes other than Southam); this had been contributed to by parishes with a surplus within the deanery in order to support those with a deficit. More parishes are now paying by standing order.

A new basis for allocation of Deanery Share begins in 2012, which takes into account the number of stipendiary clergy in the deanery, plus an amount to be used for mission within the diocese. Part of this fund would be used to support deaneries currently unable to meet the cost of their own clergy. It has been agreed in our own deanery that we do not wish to rely on subsidies for ever.

Southam Deanery currently has an equivalent of 5.93 paid clergy across its 18 parishes. (One works 0.6 of a week and another one third of a week, hence the point 93!) However we are presently being subsidised by other deaneries to the tune of 1.22 clergy or \pounds 62,626.00. Failure to meet deanery share in full will eventually have the consequence of the loss of a member of clergy. Considering our financial history at St. James, Southam, this needs to be taken seriously as our own shortfall amounts to a large proportion of that of the deanery.

Women Bishops – Following consultation within Southam Deanery it was clear that the Deanery was overwhelmingly in favour of the Measure. Alison Abbot reported from Diocesan Synod (towards the end of 2011) that much time was taken up with the debate on the ordination of women to the episcopate. Voting on the motion "That this Synod approve the proposals embodied in the draft Bishops and Priests (Consecration and Ordination of Women) Measure and in draft Amending Canon No. 30" was as follows:

House of Bishops	– two for
House of Clergy	- 35 for, two against and two abstentions
House of Laity	- 34 for, four against and one abstention.

A motion was also passed as follows: "This Synod desires that all faithful Anglicans remain and thrive together in the Church of England; supports efforts being made by the Diocese to achieve reconciliation, and therefore calls upon the House of Bishops to ensure that sufficient provision is made within the Code of Practice for those who cannot in conscience agree with the measure"

All members of St. James are encouraged to come to deanery meetings and events, as well as to ecumenical work in Southam. We are all part of the local and the wider church!

Many thanks to Bryan, Janet and Margo for their valuable deanery input during the year.

Deanery Mission Support Team Report

Towards the end of 2010 Southam Deanery Mission Support Team (SDMT) felt that they should revisit the aims and objectives of the SDMT. These were discussed, agreed and carried forward as below.

AIMS and OBJECTIVES: To enable and assist the Church in the Southam Deanery to:-

- 1. engage in evangelism appropriate to particular contexts,
- 2. make new Christians and disciples, and
- 3. nurture and develop Christian faith

The main focus during 2011 was to support the Out of the Blue Deanery Festival.

Also this year, the Rev. Craig Groocock was asked to implement changes to the format of Deanery Synod meetings to encourage more cross Deanery participation and communication. Craig shared his vision of having an open meeting for the first hour with an invited speaker to help facilitate the Diocesan Mission Statement and the SDMT supported him in putting together a three year programme inviting various speakers on the topics of Worshipping God, Making New Disciples and Transforming Communities. The programme commenced in September 2011 and will end in 2014 with a Deanery-wide Mission.

Another new venture was started by SDMT member Vikki Bisker, who set up a Facebook group called RE-MAP (Resourcing & Equipping Mission Across Parishes). There are so many people across our local parishes that have great ideas, events and resources that can equip, encourage and inspire others to not only spread the Good News, but to also continue discipling others.

RE-MAP is one way that we will be able to share these resources in an easily accessible, user-friendly manner across a wider network whilst also encouraging discussions and connecting people across parishes.

We share a passion to see lives changed and communities transformed, so let's 'encourage one another and build each other up' so that more people come to know the Living God (1 Thessalonians 5 v11).

RE-MAP is a closed group which means membership is by request and therefore monitored. If you want to be part of this exciting initiative please contact me for further details.

Combined Churches

The four Southam churches – Our Lady & St Wulstan RC Church, Wood Street Congregational Church, Southam Community Church and St James Parish Church – meet quarterly, usually represented by Father Bernard Garrett, Roy Buchanan, Pete Walley, Rev. John Armstrong, Shirley Rush (the secretary), Jan Ford and Jen Burgess. As mentioned in last year's report, more lay members would be welcome to bring new ideas. Each church has its own extensive programme during the year and occasional combined events provide additional fellowship with other Christians within our community.

The first joint event of the year was appropriately during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The Roman Catholic congregation invited members of the other three churches to join them to celebrate their feast day at the Mass of St. Wulstan in January with refreshments following the service. A good number of members of St. James Church and the Congregational Church attended.

The Congregational Church offered their lounge once again as a venue for the Lent Course. We followed this year's York Course, entitled "Rich Inheritance – Jesus' Legacy of Love" and comprising four sessions, each on a Monday evening. This course was intentionally about outreach for churches – to come together to learn, then to go out to share – and it was well-attended.

The Good Friday Walk of Witness (instigated some thirty years ago by the Community Church and later adopted by the Combined Churches) was a reminder to the town of the significance of Easter, and attracted a number of passers-by – including some youngsters - to join the short service in the library grounds. Refreshments were provided at the end at the Congregational Church.

After some debate, it was decided that the Combined Christmas card, including details of all the Christmas services, would not be sent out this year. For several years this had been printed and delivered by the District Express to most Southam households and been well received. Unfortunately the eldership of the Community Church questioned the purpose, cost and effectiveness of the card and decided not to participate. As a "united front" would not have been presented if only three churches were named, the card was cancelled for this year.

The Combined Churches nativity scene, made by Cyril Goodwin and painted by Julie Hum and Brenda Goodwin about ten years ago, was erected in the Library Grounds for the Christmas season (this year by folk at St James), more or less coinciding with the Christmas lights switch on. It was noted that some repainting is needed before its next outing!

The Advent talks, hosted by the Catholic Church, were an opportunity to enjoy a reflective half hour in friendly company.

Although the 400th anniversary of the King James Bible was discussed, no ideas were forthcoming for a combined event to mark the occasion.

The committee is always keen to receive suggestions for further combined events and will be pleased to hear from you!

St James School

Southam St. James Church of England (Voluntary Aided) Primary School is situated in Tollgate Road. Although the school has undergone some challenges in recent years we are delighted that stability has not only returned under the

strong leadership of Mrs Wankling, Headteacher, and her staff, but children's performance has noticeably improved in many areas. An OFSTED inspection is likely to take place soon – probably with very little notice – but we are confident that there will be much for the inspectors to praise.

One of our responsibilities as members of St. James Church is to pray for the children, staff and parents of St. James Primary School. Another way in which we can support the school – apart from by having children and sending them there! - is by standing as members of the governing body of the school. As it has a Church foundation we are responsible for providing approximately half of the membership of its 16-strong governing body. At the beginning of the year this included three parent governors, one local authority governor, three staff governors (including the Headteacher) and nine foundation governors, of whom two who, at the time of their appointment, should be eligible for election or appointment as parent governors.

How are the foundation governors appointed? At least seven are appointed by the Coventry Diocesan Board of Education in consultation with the PCC of St. James Church, Southam; at least one further foundation governor is similarly appointed in consultation with the PCC of All Saints, Ladbroke. Should this remain unfilled, it may be filled in consultation with the PCC of St. James Southam. With the office of Priest-in-Charge or Rector of St. James, Southam comes a foundation governor post.

Vacancies on the governing body inevitable arise from time to time – there are two at the moment. We need people who can commit themselves to working as part of an excellent team – people with expertise and people with a willingness to learn, but most of all, people with a heart for the children and a desire that they should have the best. I should like to thank all those who are, or have been, governors; their commitment, stamina and care is exemplary! Amongst those who have served with me as Foundation Governors to date have been: Vicki Armstrong, Dave Howell, Liz Bowen, Ralph Trollope, Richard Seago and David Baxter.

Many thanks to Richard and Ralph who have since left the governing body, Ralph after serving for many years in all sorts of ways.

Because our school is a Church school, it is bound to "preserve and develop its religious character in accordance with the principles of the Church of England and in partnership with the Church at parish and diocesan level". As a Christian school it aims to serve its community by providing an education of the highest quality within the context of Christian belief and practice. It encourages an understanding of the meaning and significance of faith and promotes Christian values through the experience it offers to all its pupils. Especially as there is remarkable pressure about nowadays to sideline the Christian faith, please do pray for us – and indeed why not come along and visit the school or ask if there is anything you can do to contribute to its life?

Mothers' Union

We met as usual on the second Thursday of each month, averaging twenty-one of our membership in attendance at each meeting. We started the year as usual enjoying a new-year lunch at the White Hart in Ufton. Twice during the year we were lucky enough to welcome Brenda Moss as our guest speaker. She gave a most interesting talk on Hymns and Hymn writers in February and in November she spoke of Preparing for Advent. In March a friend of Margo Grant, Amy Barber, shared many of her thoughts on various topics including grandchildren, poetry writing, knitting and crochet.

Chris Cooke gave a Lent talk in April and in May we held our Deanery Festival. The outing this year in June was to Bridge Nursery where tea and cakes were sampled. Bees Abroad in Keyna

We would like to thank the congregation at St James and St Michael & All Angels Ufton for the support not only with financial gifts but also for their prayers over the past year. It has been a real encouragement and confirmation of the work we have been able to do with health, strength and many blessings.

Bees Abroad project leaders in the UK support their projects at long range throughout the year and try to make at least one in country visit personally to check on the progress and financial position of their groups. This year we were in the position to spend nearly five weeks in Kenya for training, support and future planning of the various groups. The projects we support are in the semiarid areas and had experienced three years of drought which has now ended as we experienced unusually heavy rain which had the adverse effect on nontarmac roads. One of our project visits had to be cancelled and other times we needed to keep a close eye on approaching storms that could even in a 4x4 prevent us from returning after field work out on the farms.

We had been aware that the drought in East Africa had a knock on effect on Bee keeping and honey production. In an effort to address their poverty, the residents are often involved in environmentally destructive activities such as cutting down trees to create space for cultivation of food crops and then burn the trees for charcoal for sale by the women giving an immediate income for the families and overgrazing of livestock in arid conditions locally necessitating men and being away for long periods moving the livestock long distances from home to find grazing for the animals.

This time in Kenya we wanted to encourage the groups with their beekeeping particularly the women and demonstrate that they could undertake sustainable

activities as well as gaining control over their income. We planned to develop their confidence in adding value to their honey and beeswax so creating desperately needed employment and income all the year round. The project members had been given training previously in harvesting techniques for honey and beeswax but then these products were sold immediately when harvested providing income only for a short time and without greater value and maybe not at the best price.

With the backing of Grace Asiko, Officer in charge at the National Beekeeping Station in Nairobi we formulated a programme to train members of our beekeeping projects in adding additional value to their hive harvest. Using the wealth of skills at the station not only in the making of the products using honey and beeswax but also their in-country knowledge of suitable available ingredients and containers and where these could be sourced. We were able to arrange for Winnie, the station trainer, to undertake training courses at the location of the projects allowing all members to attend and participate. The funding for this initiative was kindly donated by Nick & Julia Bion who have previously supported the work of Bees Abroad in Kenya.

Acknowledgement must be given to Volunteer David Njuguna, our Bees Abroad in-country Trainer, who has vast beekeeping knowledge and skills. He made many visits to all the groups during the year and his encouragement and instruction have been greatly appreciated. He also undertook all the practical arrangements and organisation for the added value training courses. He was also able to locate beeswax in sufficient quantities for the groups to make the cosmetics and candles.

Also with David's help we looked at other avenues to help these people to become more aware of in-country resources. Equity Bank in Kenya provides banking services to individuals and to small and medium business enterprises and is a fast growing indigenous microfinance institution Website: www.equitybank.co.ke. Here in the UK, BBC News December 13, 2011- Kenyan hopes to open up banking to the poor Supports customers dealing with all categories of farming to carry out various farming activities including purchase of farm inputs and equipment with access to discounted business improvement trainings and to advisory services. Other in-country resources to be used by our groups are the social services and Kenyan ministry agriculture extension officers

We now work closely with Desert Edge (<u>www.biotrade.co.ke</u>) which is based in Nanuki under the direction of Susie Wren. It was a privilege to spend some days looking at their facilities which include a laboratory for increasing the value of indigenous plant material and products also their honey house and then out on field visits to some of their beekeeping groups in the area of Lakepia and Samburu. Our two organisations have much in common in the desire to assist rural people benefit from beekeeping and adding value to hive products. We have in place plans to work together in the future sharing knowledge expertise and management in beekeeping businesses.

The Africa Inland Mission Church/Cheptebo Rural Development Centre(CRDC) www.cheptebordcentre.org was started in 1986 when the church recognised the spiritual as well as the physical needs of the people and a holistic approach was adopted. It is Christ centred as well as a learning place where the community gets knowledge on the best farming practices. It is a 50 acre demonstration farm specialising in production in semi-arid areas. Farm activities include irrigated and dry land crop production, a livestock unit (dairy cattle and dairy goats) and a tree nursery). Cheptebo teaches farmers how to grow traditional and new crops on their land, but they also grow and sell tree seedlings and manage several livestock projects that help families own their own improved goats or cows. The centre is also used as a retreat centre for many churches schools and organisations.

We were privileged to join them as they celebrated 25 years since Bill Rettie arrived in Cheptebo to help fulfil a vision in an area considered to have a low potential. It is now recognised by the Kenyan government and the Ministry of Agriculture as a centre of excellence.

This is an ideal location to support the development of beekeeping which is seen as not only an economic activity that can reduce the high level of poverty in the Kerio Valley, but also an environmental conservation measure by introducing tree planning as part of the projects. Plans are now well in hand to develop training apiary with catcher boxes (small bait hives to attract swarms) already hung in a suitable place and baited to attract swarms. Discussion also took place to supply 4 KTB hives.

During our time at the centre Dave Bonner, who was with us, presented the farm manager Walter Rono and his staff with seven sets of used protective bee suits. These had been generously donated by the National Bee keeping Unit in the UK and will be extremely useful as a resource when the training apiary is up and running. Walter has recently attended a course on beekeeping at the National beekeeping station in Nairobi.

We ran a two day course on adding value to hive products attended by 30 people from the centre and locality. There is a shop located in the grounds so the aim is to have products available for sale in the future.

The Sinyati Women's group project is typical of the work of Bees Abroad in that because of its remoteness it would not receive help easily from other organisations. We are prepared to help a group like this who respond so positively from training and encouragement that they have moved forward so much since our last visit with the interim training they have received from David's visits and participating in the added value training courses.

The recent heavy rains made for difficult conditions on the mud/stone tracks and took two hours from our accommodation to reach their village so it was an encouragement to find the group has continued to make progress. They had made Sinyati a-maizing bee suit from maize sacks for sale and had already started making and successfully selling body cream following the value addition training- the beginnings of a prosperous small enterprise. They are very keen to share their skills by encouraging more women in the community to do beekeeping showing them that beekeeping can be women friendly by having KTB hives and protective clothing at affordable prices enabling them to harvest their own honey without involving help from the men.

The one low spot during this past year was the raid by the notorious Pokot tribe who put the fear in everyone by spraying the village with bullets and then without resistance stole their 40 milking goats. We spent time sheltering under the trees and demonstrated other products they could make and consider other plans for the future. We discussed how beekeeping was a safer option for income generation than goats as the warriors would not be interested in stealing their hives.

This group is always very colourful in that they wear their traditional red costumes at our meetings and on this visit we were both humbled to receive beautifully handmade Maasai clothing which we really do treasure.

Following further exceptionally overnight rain it was not possible to make the journey to the group next day so the programme was rearranged and one final day was spent visiting the groups fields where they had planted beans which they bought from a small amount of aid sent out from St James following the loss of their goats. They have used this money not only for themselves but also for their community to fulfil their policy of giving 10% of their income to those in need.

We also needed to identify and make plans for a new training/group site. The current hives are situated very close to the dirt road and people were being stung as they passed by when practical beekeeping was undertaken.

We were very impressed with the way this group worked not only for themselves but also for their community and encouraged them to apply for an award from the Seed Initiative.

The SEED Initiative (www.seedinit.org) is a global partnership for action on sustainable development and the green economy. SEED supports innovative around the globe which integrate social and environmental benefits into their business model. The goal of SEED is to <u>support</u> the ability of such entrepreneurs to scale up or replicate their activities. This furthers their contribution to their local economies and communities while promoting sustainable management of natural resources and ecosystems and reducing poverty, marginalisation and exclusion. Sinyati women's group did very well being one of 82 short listed projects.

The International Campaigner Award is for campaigners outside the UK working to achieve social or environmental justice in their home countries and was won by Caroline Lentupuru from the Sinyati project (<u>http://www.smk.org.uk/international-award-2011</u>).

Caroline is campaigning in villages and schools in her local area to ensure that young girls aged between twelve and 16 are not forced to undergo female genital mutilation and into early marriage which also leads to them dropping out of school. She wants young girls to be able to continue with their education and become more self-reliant, which in turn will lead to her minority indigenous community becoming educated and free from poverty.

Between November 23 and December 5 2011 Caroline came to the UK to receive her award, attend skills building training and other meetings in London. She had the opportunity to meet two MPs influential regarding overseas development and was able to discuss and stress the importance of UK aid being more effective when provided to smaller efficient grass route organisation in developing countries.

We arrived back from Kenya on December 3 and were thrilled to be able to arrange for Caroline to extend her stay and visit us for a couple of days here in Warwickshire. She wished to personally thanks the congregation at St James for their support to her people.

Our time in Kenya was so worthwhile.

Farmers' Market Prayer Stall

In May 2012 we shall celebrate our fourth anniversary as honorary farmers!

Convinced of God's call for us as a church to be "out there" in the community rather than expecting the community to come to us, we set up stall in the grounds of Southam library on the morning of Saturday 12 April 2008 to coincide with the Farmers' Market, offering to pray in the name of Jesus for anyone, whether for healing or any other need.

Not only did we engage in conversation with numbers of people but on that very same day we were also invited by the stall-holders on the Farmers' Market to come and join them the following month! Ever since then a small group of us has been part of the market on almost every occasion, in sunshine and rain, banners declaring we are from St. James and that we offer prayer for healing.

The farmers very much appreciate us being there; they know we pray for them and tell us that it really does make a difference when we have to leave – or if we have been unable to come. It's also a great opportunity to chat to people who pass by – and we even end up as relief stallholders should the need arise!

This of course is only one example of what we as Christians *can* do, but a few of us *are* doing it and the work is bearing fruit. We could do with expanding the team. Would you like to consider joining us? No previous experience necessary, on the job training provided; it's an opportunity to make a difference with God.

We ask: Stressed? Worried? Lost? Bereaved? Lonely? Sick? Afraid? May we pray for you?

We are also asking: Will you come and join in?

I have only been involved with the Men's Breakfasts for the last five years or so, but according to a letter that John Rice passed on to me when he moved to Hereford, the first meeting took place on the 26 February 2000 at the Stoneythorpe Hotel and the talk was given by a good friend of mine, Steve Clarke who was then Associate Director of CORD.

Since then we have had a few venue changes. When the Stoneythorpe became too expensive we moved to EFE's on the High Street in March 2009 which, whilst not having the same comforts as the Stoneythorpe at least meant that we did not have to move to a different room to hear our guest speaker. However in the September they asked us to move to the later time of 9.00am, which did not suit at all, so back we went to the Stoneythorpe, only to find that after just one event it had been sold and could no longer accommodate us!

Undaunted we found a new location – the Village Hall in Ufton - not as convenient as Southam admittedly, but it was warm and bright and could easily accommodate us in style.
