#### Thought for the month of July from Stephen Adams Churchwarden

Recently at St James we have been thinking about the various statements that Jesus spoke out while dying on the cross. The historian Luke when describing the events of the crucifixion recorded Jesus as saying, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."

What was it that they were they doing? They were crucifying Jesus. He was about to die.

Why were they doing that? There were various groups with differing reasons and motivations.

The Romans saw Jesus as a threat to their peace and security. The political activists were angry that Jesus had not led a popular uprising against the Roman occupation. The Jewish leaders viewed Jesus as a dangerous troublemaker who broke their rules and turned society upside down. The rich opposed him because he upset the status quo by supporting the poor and marginalised. The priests and the religious leaders hated him because he claimed to be God, did miracles and healed people and that seriously threatened their status and power. Whatever their reasons for wanting him dead and out of the way, did anyone wonder how this man would react in his final hour?

The man who had said "Love your enemies" and "pray for those who persecute you" - how would he really respond to direct cruelty and personal pain? Would he be consistent to his own teaching when he himself was in excruciating agony?

Jesus proved to be totally consistent, his integrity was whole and complete. Even as he died he demonstrated the lifestyle of the kingdom, the central theme of his teaching and many of his parables **forgiveness**.

Jesus didn't rage or even hint at hitting back. He forgave and goes on forgiving. As he hung, nailed and alone on the cross, that awful instrument of torture and execution, he cried out "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing"

What they failed to realise but what Jesus understood was that every act of cruelty, every hurt inflicted, every inhumanity, damages not just the recipient but also the perpetrator, adding more toxins to the poison in the human system. And forgiveness is the only antidote, the only means of healing that damage and extracting the poison.

Jesus knew that the old rules of an eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, just don't work. Revenge, retaliation and the continuing cycle of pain and hurt can only be broken by the overwhelming power of forgiveness.

In the classic film "Ben Hur", Charlton Heston as Judah Ben Hur is seeking revenge against those who have caused him and his family great hurt and pain but after seeing Jesus being crucified on the cross he declares "that man took the sword right out of my hand".

As forgiveness is sown, it acts like a seed, and amazingly it produces a harvest of love. The act of forgiveness allows the power of the kingdom of God to enter the situation and the result is an overflowing of God's love. The chains of bitterness and resentment can only be broken by forgiveness.

Human love is usually restricted to our friends and those we like, and yes we may also feel concern for those in need, but to love those who have hurt us, to love those who make fun of us, to love those who deliberately inflict pain - that love is God's love - the love that we see at work on the cross. Will we chose to share in that love which can conquer the world? We recognise that it wasn't just the Romans and the religious leaders who put Jesus on the cross. It was for every single one of us that Jesus cried out "Father, forgive them for they do not know what they are doing."

And Father God <u>has</u> forgiven us. Will we chose to receive that forgiveness? And in turn will we chose to forgive others and find ourselves released from bitterness or resentment?

We shall be delighted to welcome as our Speaker Sue Sampson from Carriers of Hope. The charity started in May 2009 when it was noticed that there were a number of asylum seekers, refugees and Eastern European migrants living in the Coventry area who were experiencing extreme poverty and lacking the most basic personal and household facilities.

Initially carrier bags of "useful things" were handed out, whilst encouraging friends and supporters, mainly from local churches, to join in and help to provide them; it was those carrier bags that provided the name *Carriers of Hope*. This was quickly followed by an open morning in a church hall which in turn led by June 2012 to the establishment of a permanent site at Hillfields Church, together with a warehouse storing equipment and furniture.

Sue has an interesting tale to tell; average attendance is now 130 at their Tuesday Drop-In, Circle of Friends, 1,500 families have registered for their service and they have worked with families from over 60 different countries.
